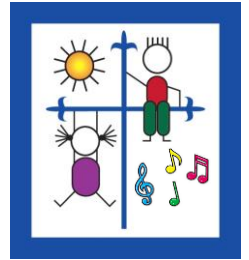

## Warden's Words by David Drislane

The Force Awakens – Some Reflections On The Year

My fellow brothers and sister in Christ, it's hard to believe 2015 will be coming to a close in just a few short days. As I reflect back on the past year, I think the new Star Wars movie "The Force Awakens" is an appropriate description of what has happened here at Christ Church this past year. [Editor's Note: Don't worry – no spoilers ahead]

Similar to the name of the movie, something here has truly awakened and spurred our church family here at Christ Church to move forward to do God's work with a new passion. For a few years before our new Rector arrived, we were a congregation in a slumber just moving along and existing without truly having an impact on ourselves or our surrounding communities. Now we have awoken with a force! Our congregation is leading the way for us to live out our mission, which is to grow in faith, serve our neighbors and create community.



Several examples of the force awakening started or grew this past year. One of these was Theology on Tap, where on every third Thursday of the month, members of the community are invited to meet at Fitzgerald's in Glen Ridge for a discussion over the beverage of your choice. The theological topics varied each month and provided a forum where everyone of any denomination or believe system could come to express their thoughts on a subject in a safe and comfortable environment.

In addition, an Outreach Group was formed, led by Stephanie Reynolds and David Brinkerhoff, with the goal of getting us more engaged with our surrounding communities. They already organized and ran a very successful rummage sale back in November. In January they will be hosting the first blood drive in our parish hall with the Red Cross in memory of Raymar Lecky.

This year as well, under the leadership of our Youth and Family Ministries Director, Candice Whitaker, our Sunday School has grown in numbers, and we held our first Vacation Bible School, serving 12 children between the ages of 3 – 12 with the assistance of Cross Roads Camp. It was a resounding success and demonstrated the commitment your Vestry and leadership team has taken in investing more time and money in our youth and families ministries. We have already booked this again for summer 2016, so reserve your spot early as we expect it to be sold out.



One of my favorite services was our Annual Blessing of the Animals to aid the work of PAWS in Montclair. For those of us who are pet lovers, this service is always a moving and spiritual one. During the summer we also installed a pet watering station on the Park Avenue side of our church for our four legged friends to provide a cool drink during the hot summer days. This small action was very well received by members of our local community. The unconditional love we give and receive from our pets draws us more deeply into the larger circle of life with our Creator.

Your vestry in 2015 worked diligently on a major infrastructure project. This project is a key component to help us provide more modern and updated facilities for our nursery school while also providing the church facilities for further growth so we can better serve our surrounding communities. I would be remiss if I did not mention the countless hours during the summer that our Warden Bill Seeman and Treasurer Dan Wing took of their time and talent to work on the budget numbers to help make this project a reality. Without their financial expertise we would have been lost. Thank you Bill and Dan for everything you do for the people of this parish. It is projected to be completed by the end of June for the start of the new Nursery School year on July 1<sup>st</sup>. As a result of this extensive exercise, the Vestry also clearly saw more than ever before how the church and nursery school are



one – partners in an important relationship, and that this project is needed for the long term sustainability of both. The infrastructure project was approved by your Vestry at our November meeting, and we are set to start work just after the new year begins.

I completed writing this article the evening after returning from our first ever Advent Festival of Lessons & Carols. What a wonderful and deeply moving event which was attended by over 90 people from our community! It was such a blessing to take time away from the Christmas hustle and bustle so we could just sit back and experience the wonderful joy and spirit of the Christmas season. Our choir, which has grown considerably this year under the leadership of Bill Davies, must be commended for the outstanding performance they delivered that evening and every Sunday. Music for many of us is a spiritual and unifying way to connect with God during our church

## Music Notes by Bill Davies, Director of Music

History, Music, and Lessons & Carols

We have recently celebrated the Advent service of Lessons and Carols at Christ Church and, in some past years, we have used part of the Christmas service of Lessons and Carols in the late service on Christmas Eve. These services are not all that old, as liturgical traditions go, but they have quickly become an essential element of the season in the Anglican Communion. That seems to be the case because they have so successfully touched both historical and musical chords.

The original Lessons and Carols service (for Christmas) was first celebrated in 1880 in Truro, England and was quickly adopted by other English churches. It found its most important home, however, when it was first held at King's College, Cambridge in 1918. That December 24<sup>th</sup> fell just a little over a month after the end of the First World War, a war which had decimated not only thousands of English soldiers, but also European conceptions of war as a glorious endeavor which left men covered in glory. In that context, worshippers at King's heard the Dean read out the now-famous final line of the bidding prayer: "Lastly, let us remember before God all those who rejoice with us, but upon another shore, and in a greater light, that multitude which no man can number, whose hope was in the Word made flesh, and with whom in the Lord Jesus we are forever one." Of course the prayer was composed to remember all the dead, but the immediacy of the just-ended war and the raw reality



of lost sons, husbands and brothers imbued the Christmas celebration that year with a twinge of longing that is often still recalled by commentators on the annual service, which is now broadcast around the world on Christmas Eve.

But the music composed for Lessons and Carols is its vital legacy and can be rightly said to have redefined the sound of Christmas for the entire Anglican Communion, as indeed it has for many outside it. Boris Ord ("Adam Lay Ybounden"), Harold Drake ("In the Deep Midwinter") and

perhaps most famously David Willcocks ("Tomorrow Shall Be My Dancing Day" and the almost universally sung descant to "O Come, All Ye Faithful") served as successive organists and choir directors at King's, accounting for an incredible history of musical output from 1929 to 1973, a record that has continued under Philip Ledger (1974-82) and Stephen Cleobury, who has held the post for the past 33 years.

Profound history and profound music are a powerful combination, and they have combined for over one hundred years to give birth to the music of Christmas.

Toddlers, preschoolers, and our Kindergarten class will all perform for each other, relatives and friends! We have a “special” guest who joins us at the end of our program, HO. HO. HO’ing his way through the crowd to the stage so he can hand out presents to all of the children. So exciting for everyone!!!

On December 9<sup>th</sup> we had an interactive puppet show for the school, hosted by Ms. Cheryl. The children all get to participate in part of a story, and they truly enjoy her time with us. ## Youth News

Our Youth Group shopped for presents as part of the Giving Tree (See Outreach Notes for more information). They also attended the Bloomfield-Glen Ridge-Montclair Interfaith Thanksgiving Service, which took place at a local church, with a member of a local synagogue giving the homily.

In January, the Youth Group will participate in the Souper Bowl of Caring. The Souper Bowl is a nationwide outreach effort aimed using the energy of the Super Bowl to mobilize youth to care for people in their local communities who are hungry and those in need. Our Youth Group will be collecting donations and food for the Presbyterian Church on the Green Food Pantry during the weeks leading up to the Super Bowl, and of course at worship on Super Bowl Sunday, so stay tuned.



## Adult Formation



Christ Church isn't only for the young, but the young at heart too! Adult Formation is an important part of living into our baptismal covenant. This year there have been a number of Adult Forums after worship. The topics have engaged a wide range of theological and contemporary areas, including: Epiphany: The Jesus and Peter Moments of Our Lives, Lent Madness, The Gospel Parallels, The Bible & Homosexuality, Spooks & Saints, Episcopal 101, Ways to Pray. We also had a wonderful presentation by Len Roberts on his trip to Turkey. In January there will be a three part series on the Gospel of Luke, and a Diocesan Convention report back.

There is also a Men's Group, a Book Club, Zen Meditation, Labyrinth Walk & Compline services on Wednesdays, and of course, the popular Theology on Tap. Upcoming topics will be announced in our Sunday Paper, which is available every week in print, and online (as is our Bulletin). So, check it all out. ## Outreach

In the past few months, Christ Church has been busy doing the work of Christ in the world. Our first Craft Fair & Rummage Sale, run by our newly formed Outreach Group, was held in November, with the proceeds going to support outreach in our community.

Also in November, parishioners brought forward loads of groceries the Sunday before Thanksgiving to donate to the Presbyterian Church on the Green Food Pantry. Over the past two years, we have developed a strong partnership with them in their ministry to



feed the needy. They were blown away by the amount of food we had collected, and needed multiple trips to pick it all up!

Then the Giving Tree went up, and the congregation responded as they do every year, with exceeding generosity. Just look at all those presents! North Porch was blown away by what we delivered to their families for Christmas. If you are unfamiliar with the work of North Porch, it is a ministry in our diocese that supports women and their children. In

November alone, they served 124 children, which translates to about 6200 diapers distributed, 9920 baby wipes, 1240 jars of baby food, and approximately 75 cans of

formula. What better ministry to support in Advent when we await the birth of Jesus, born in humble means to Mary.

Also in this time of year the choir organizes a caroling afternoon for the seniors at South End Gardens in Montclair, where some of our own parishioners live. What a turnout we had this year, and as always, it was fun for everyone!

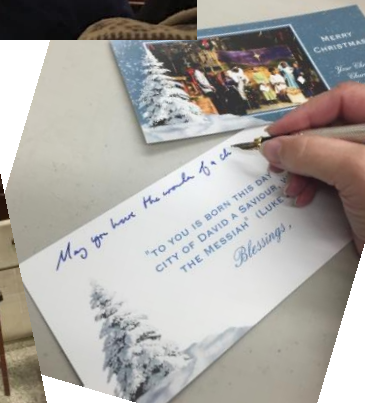
