## Warden's Words by Bill Seeman

As I complete my last year as Warden, it is natural to reflect on the past four years and the progress we have made at Christ Church.

Many of you will recall that the future of the church seemed to be in doubt as we began 2013. Our financial position appeared to be tenuous as we became increasingly dependent on endowment funds to support church operations, and it was estimated that we would not be able to sustain our level of draw against those funds beyond the middle of 2015. The way forward seemed to involve continuous cost cutting and downsizing to keep the church open in the face of declining



revenue. It was suggested that we would not be able to afford our beautiful and beloved sanctuary for much longer.

Fortunately, the new Rector, the Wardens and the Vestries of 2014-2016 found the downsizing alternative unacceptable and, with your consent, embarked on a new course. The plan featured a synergistic approach that combined the strengths of the church and the nursery school to ensure our future in a sound financial environment. You have all seen the results of the plan, but as a reminder:

- We have survived and flourished well beyond the middle of 2015.
- We have developed a first-rate music program.
- We have refurbished and beautified the church buildings.
- We have grown the congregation.
- We have expanded the nursery school to generate necessary revenue for the entire organization.
- We have rebuilt our Sunday School.
- We have become a positive force in our communities.

These accomplishments have been achieved through the tireless work of not only the Rector, Wardens,



Vestry and Treasurer, but also through the talented staff that has been put in place in the music, nursery school, finance and youth leadership positions. Our excellent lay leadership and staff position us well to continue a high level of achievement for the foreseeable future. And of course, the support and involvement of each and every one of you, through your ministry, pledges, and time, made all of this possible.

It has been an honor and privilege to serve you, the people of Christ Church. Thank you for the opportunity!

### Music Notes by Bill Davies, Director of Music

Winter Is Icumen In

There is a famous medieval round – "famous" to music nerds, anyway – that begins "Sumer is icumen in/ lhude sing cucu!" Which means: "Summer has arrived/ Sing loudly, cuckoo!" Inevitably, the discovery of this song led a twentieth century wag (Ezra Pound, in fact) to pen a parody. It begins, "Winter is icumen in/ ludhe sing goddamn!" Yes indeed, winter is here, with its snow, slush, cold, and other unpleasant stuff. Not only that, but the zippy music of Christmas will soon be past until next year. But wait! There's some really good music coming up during the winter here at Christ Church, and it may well help you get through the gray days of winter until the cuckoo sings again. Here's preview.

"These Are They Which Follow the Lamb," John Goss: An English composer of the late 19<sup>th</sup> century, Goss is probably best known as the composer of the hymn "Praise my soul the king of heaven." He was director of music at St. Paul's



Cathedral in London, having assumed the position at a time when musical standards at that important church were quite low. He struggled to improve them, and many of his compositions emerged from that



struggle. This anthem is a beautifully simple setting of a text from the Book of Revelation. "Simple" in the sense that there aren't too many acrobatic choral moves, but the harmony requires immense precision and a sense of musical line. The effect is stunning.

"The Beatitudes," traditional Russian chant, arranged by Richard Proulx. Proulx was an important twentieth century American church musician (He died in 2010), who had a broad influence, having edited hymnals in use in the Methodist, Roman Catholic and Episcopal churches. Here, he has brought the wonderful Russian Orthodox tradition of rich chant


singing into the modern western canon. There is, however, a long history of theological and liturgical dialogue between the Anglican Communion and the Orthodox Church, so Proulx's foray is only a recent example of a rich tradition. The text is from the Gospel of Matthew.

"Blest Are the Pure in Heart," H. Walford Davies. This is a setting of the familiar text by John Keble, one of the leaders of the Oxford Movement. The music is a little gem, just two pages long, of lush, and sometimes unexpected, harmony. The composer, though not terribly well known to Americans, was something of a public personality in England because he served as the music advisor to the nascent BBC, and provided on-air explanations of musical selections from the 1920s into the early years of World War II. He served also as Master of the King's Music.

And there's more, including some perennial favorites such as John Stainer's "God So Loved the World," and Samuel Wesley's "Lead Me, Lord." So, don't hide from the winter and rough weather. Come to church and be warmed by the sounds of great choral music.

#### **Youth News**

Last Summer, our Youth Group had artwork displayed in the *People Who Love Us/People We Love* exhibit of Children's Art at St. Luke's Metuchen. The opening exhibit & reception was Saturday, June 11<sup>th</sup> and we couldn't have been more proud of them.

In the Fall, our Youth Group shifted from a mostly High School age group to one that is more middle school aged, with 2 high schoolers as well, due to many of our high schoolers heading off to college. The youth also made tags for the Giving Tree (See Outreach Notes for more information). In January, the Youth Group will again participate in the Souper Bowl of Caring (the picture below is from last year's effort – so much food for those in need!) The Souper Bowl is a nationwide outreach effort aimed at using the energy of the Super Bowl to mobilize youth to care for people in their local communities who are hungry and in need. Our Youth Group will be collecting donations and food for the Presbyterian Church on the Green Food Pantry during the weeks leading up to the Super Bowl, and of course at worship on Super Bowl Sunday, so stay tuned.

#### **Adult Formation**



Christ Church isn't only for the young, but the young at heart too! Adult Formation is an important part of living into our baptismal covenant. This year, due to scheduling conflicts, there has not been as many Adult Forums. The topics we did cover were The Letters of Paul, The Gospel of Luke, The Episcopal Church, and a Diocesan Convention report back. Other topics in the past have touched on a wide range of theological and contemporary areas, including: Epiphany: The Jesus and Peter Moments of Our Lives, Lent Madness, The Gospel Parallels, The Bible & Homosexuality, Spooks & Saints, and Ways to Pray. Coming up this Spring will be forums on: The Gospel of Matthew, and Women at the Well. There is also a Men's Group, a Book Club, Labyrinth Walk & Compline services on Wednesdays, Evening Prayer on Thursdays, and of course, the popular Theology on Tap. We will be launching a Women's Group in the Spring, and perhaps a few other groups too, so check it all out.

#### Outreach









In the past few months, Christ Church has been busy doing the work of Christ in the world. During our annual Blessing of the Animals in October, we presented checks and supplies to PAWS Montclair, and to the Bloomfield Animal Shelter (see pictures at left). We are always so grateful to our Warden, David Drislane, who organizes this service. The donations were from the parish, but the blessing of animals brings in people from all over our community, and is itself an outreach program.

In November, parishioners brought forward loads of groceries the Sunday before Thanksgiving to donate to the Presbyterian Church on the Green Food Pantry. Over the past three years, we have developed a strong partnership with them in their ministry to feed the needy. They were blown away by the amount of food we had collected, and needed multiple trips to pick it all up! Thank you Christopher Dwyer for helping get the food to them.

Then the Giving Tree went up, and the congregation responded as they do every year, with exceeding generosity. Just look at all those presents! North Porch was blown away by what we delivered to their families for Christmas. If you are unfamiliar with the work of North Porch, it is a ministry in our diocese that supports women and their children. In November alone, they served 124 children, which translates to about 6200 diapers distributed, 9920 baby wipes, 1240 jars of baby food, and approximately 75 cans of formula. What better ministry to support in Advent when we await the birth of Jesus, born in humble means to Mary.

Also in this time of year, the choir organizes a caroling afternoon for the seniors at South End Gardens in Montclair, where some of our own parishioners live. What a turnout we

## The Infrastructure Project Changes Everything!!!

This past year, we finally were able to realize the plans for our renewed and restored Church and Nursery School spaces. It all began in February of 2014, when a group of lay leaders, Mother Diana, and the leadership of the Nursery School, gathered in the Coursen Room to talk about the space issues each were facing, and to determine what opportunities existed to remediate them. Specifically, the Nursery School was at capacity (with wait lists for every class), and more space for an expanded Kindergarten was needed. Also, the Pre-School II Class was in a rather uncomfortable space on the 1st floor of 74 Park. The church had space issues as well. We needed to





have the Rector's office on the first floor to make it more accessible to people, and we needed a parlor or a library (see final space below), with sofas, and chairs, allowing for a more intimate sacred meeting space.

We also changed the Coursen Room itself, realizing that, due to the old casement style single pane windows, with the heat registers just below, we were losing heat, and we could not cool the space either. To add to that problem, we had those large walls (see them in the picture at left, as they were being removed) that essentially blocked whatever heat might have made it into the room. This was a problem not only for the

church, but also the school, as that room is used 6 days a week by both. And then there was the unused space on the 2<sup>nd</sup> floor of the Parish Hall, that had been the church's Sunday School classrooms. We managed to get the bathroom working up there, but the space itself was in need of a major overhaul, and so it went unused.

The project cost \$350,000 for the construction, and another \$50,000 for related expense (legal paperwork, furniture, architectural plans, etc.). The Ribbon Cutting and Blessing was on Oct. 4<sup>th</sup>, and we were happy to have our bishop, the Rt. Rev. Mark Beckwith, there to consecrate the newly renovated spaces.




As a result of this project, both the church and our school have a brighter future. The ability to offer better church program and office space, to increase our infant room capacity, and even to add a new class – PS III (the age just before Kindergarten) has breathed new life into Christ Church. This was a project that was truly Spirit led, but it took this congregation's willingness to go where She was leading, to make it all happen.


